Helping over 1500 People a Year

The Martlets Hospice helps people who are living with terminal illness and for whom curative treatment is no longer possible. We also help patients' families, carers and friends through bereavement by offering counselling, advice and support when they most need it.

The Martlets Hospice opened in 1997 from the merger of Coppercliff Hospice and Tarner Home. Our facilities and services include an in-patient unit, day hospice, Martlets@Home service, and bereavement and counselling services.

Serving the Local Community

We are a local charity serving the people of Brighton and Hove and the surrounding area including Portslade, Peacehaven, Saltdean, Newhaven, Rottingdean, Lewes and Ringmer.

All Hospice services are provided free of charge by a dedicated staff team including health professionals supported by over 400 part-time volunteers. It now costs £3.5million a year to run the Martlets, yet only just over a quarter of our income comes from government. That is why we rely so heavily on the generous and continuing support of the local community.

Everything we do supports patient choice and aims to give people the very best quality of life in the time they have left.
